COURSE DESCRIPTION AND REQUIREMENTS:

WOMACK'S EDUCATION PHILOSOPHY/FOCUS: Education is a life-long endeavor that can only be attained by the individual wanting to be educated. No one else can put data or ideas into your mind...that is up to you. If you should choose to become educated, then you, too, must make the decision to learn...despite others who might distract you, give you false information, or not "click" with your personality. Each of us must pave or own path to education. No teacher can MAKE you learn. Only YOU can MAKE YOU learn. I cannot MAKE YOU a good student. I can only give you my best as an instructor. In other words, I can only do my part...you can do your part...We both are responsible for our own actions.

You are now a college student. What worked in K-12 may possibly not work in college. The level of participation, commitment, reading and thinking is higher now.

COURSE DESCRIPTION. Teaches critical skills in relation to public speaking. Emphasis on the process, principles and major facets of critical thinking with practice through oral presentations. Prerequisite: Communication 097 for non-native English-speaking students. Advisory reading level: 3.

PLANS FOR INSTRUCTION. The objective of this course is to integrate public speaking theory and the act of public speaking. As communicators, we must know what public communication is and how to behave most effectively to maximize our communication skills in the public speaking forum. Our knowledge influences our skills and our skills test our knowledge.

This course includes.

Speeches

- Lectures,
- Workshops
- Written assignments applying concepts to experience
- Three exams covering the text.

REQUIREMENTS: My plan of action is to run this classroom like an organization. Instead of earning a paycheck, you are earning knowledge and college credit. The classroom is a place for ADULTS to learn and work toward self-understanding and college credit. *The classroom is NOT the student* lounge, your living room, the local coffee house or any place other than what it is...a classroom where, from the start until the end of the period, the sole purpose is to provide an ethical, humane, academically rigorous yet personable and fun environment where ALL are respected as valued Beings and where learning is top priority. Therefore, I WILL NOT TOLERATE any behavior (words or actions) that interfere with my teaching abilities and/or the learning abilities of everyone enrolled in this class. I WILL NOT TOLERATE any behavior (words or actions) that intimidate or otherwise treat another as an inferior. I apply these statements to myself as well as to each of you. Everyone in the classroom is a living, breathing adult; NOT a radio, television, or CD player making background noise. We all have equal share in this space called the classroom.



Space

My classroom is part of the **Safe Space** Project. For learning to take place, students must feel safe; this safety is for ALL students, not only those who share your values and beliefs. For this reason, courtesy, thoughtfulness, and acceptance are essential in our discussions in and out of the classroom. Acceptance should not be confused with agreement; one need not agree with a person to listen, but one must listen well to disagree respectfully and in an informed manner. Every student in this course has a voice and, therefore, deserves the courtesy of attentive listening and the freedom to express diverse ideas. If, at any time, you feel that you are not receiving this courtesy from me or from your fellow students, please bring it to my attention.

Once you are in the classroom, do not get up and walk in and out of the room. This is a distraction to me. If I am distracted, I am not teaching at my best. If you are out of the room, you cannot listen to what I have to say. Empty your bladder before coming to class. Return calls/texts between classes. If you are taking drugs or drinking alcohol...I don't want to know about it and you need to NOT be doing these on campus. If I do find out, you will be expelled. This is college. Show your commitment by showing up and staying focused the entire time. You have chosen to be here. You are not required to enroll in college.

ALL NON-CLASSROOM SPECIFIC ELECTRONIC DEVICES MUST BE TURNED OFF DURING CLASS.

Lap top computer/tablets may be used in class for the sole purpose of taking notes for THIS class. If used for other reasons, your laptop/tablet privileges will be revoked for the entire semester.

The requirements for this course fall into 4 categories:

- 1. Classroom Behavior
- 2. Attendance
- 3. Assignments
- Grading



CLASSROOM BEHAVIOR: Everyone in this class has the right to be treated as adults with respect. If you are being mistreated, assertively speak up; tell the individual what you need/want. Everyone in this classroom has the responsibility to respect all others as adults.

SHOW UP AND BE PRESENT!

- Do not walk out of the classroom once the class has begun. Go to the restroom before and
 after the class. Take calls during your break between classes. Violation of this will result in a
 quarter of an absence for the day. If you walk out twice, you have earned half an absence, etc.
 COMMIT TO THE CLASS. COMMIT TO BEING THE BEST STUDENT YOU CAN BE.
 - Be prepared to contribute to class discussions daily
 - Use appropriate humor
 - Use assertive, adult behavior
 - Self-motivate and monitor
 - Consider others' needs and wants
 - Engage in open, constructive conversation about the course or related materials
 - Be honest when you are having difficulties and successes



ATTENDANCE: At work you are not paid extra for showing up. You are expected to be at work giving full effort to keep your job and earn your contracted pay. Earning college credit is not just about completing assignments; it is assumed that the student will be present and active within the classroom. This is not a correspondence course. The State of California considers attendance an integral part in earning college credit. **ATTENDANCE IS MANDATORY**. Because of the experiential/workshop nature of this course, your absence affects not only your overall performance, but also the performance of the entire class.



The Absence/Drop policy (SCC College Catalog) reads as follows: "It is the student's responsibility to withdraw from a course. However, because of enrollment demand a student may be dropped by the instructor when not appearing at the first class meeting. A student may also be dropped for excessive absences when the total hours of absence exceed 10% (4.8 hours) of the total scheduled hours of the class. Under extenuating circumstances, a student may be reinstated by the instructor." In accordance with this policy, I will drop a student on the 3rd absence. The ONLY exception to this is considered (not automatic) if the absence is due to a VERIFIABLE, severe medical or personal emergency that allows you no reasonable choice when considering coming to class. These absences will only be considered excused if verification and contact is provided WITHIN 24 HOURS OF THE ABSENCE. This means a telephone call from you (or someone speaking for you). Treat this like a job.

YOU ARE REQUIRED TO MEET ALL DEADLINES LISTED ON THE COURSE CALENDAR, WHETHER PRESENT OR ABSENT...Remember those choices we all must make and either

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celebrate the rewards or mourn the risks. On the 3rd absence you will be dropped (if before the deadline to drop) or given a grade of "F" in the course (if after the deadline to drop). Be forewarned! This matter is strictly up to you. Observe the rules...especially the 24-hour rule. WHEN IN DOUBT, COMMUNICATE WITH THE INSTRUCTOR!

Those of you who miss the second meeting of the class will be dropped.

Those of you who missed the first session without a verifiable excused absence have already earned one absence.

THE 24-HOUR RULE IS: YOU (OR A PERSON REPRESENTING YOU) MUST CONTACT ME WITHIN 24 HOURS (IN EITHER DIRECTION) OF THE MISSED CLASS SESSION. IF YOU DO NOT CONTACT ME WITHIN 24 HOURS, YOU FORFEIT THE POSSIBILITY OF EARNING AN EXCUSED ABSENCE. EVEN IF YOU CONTACT ME, YOU STILL MUST PROVIDE FORMAL VERIFICATION OF YOUR ABSENCE (GET PROOF!)

3. ASSIGNMENTS: Late projects in the workplace are not tolerated except in severe cases of personal or medical emergencies. The same is true in this class.

ALL ASSIGNMENTS ARE DUE AT THE BEGINNING OF THE REQUIRED CLASS PERIOD. IF I CHANGE ANY DUE DATE, I WILL ANNOUNCE THE CHANGE IN CLASS. STUDENTS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR KEEPING TRACK OF ALL DUE DATES, ORIGINAL AND CHANGED. CHECK WITH ME WHEN IN DOUBT OR IF ABSENT

LATE ASSIGNMENTS AND MISSED IN-CLASS ASSIGNMENTS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. Only in EXTREME cases will Prof. Womack consider make-up assignments.



The course grade is based upon a 1950-point total. There is no extra credit. I do not assume a higher grade if your score falls within the gray area between grades. I will look at exams, speeches, improvement, submission of work, and connection with the class during class time.

The breakdown is by percentage. You are not competing against one another, rather, you are competing against standards set with each assignment and within this syllabus. Therefore, there may be no "A" grades in this class, or potentially, everyone could earn a grade of "A." This holds true for all levels of achievement regarding grades.

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Students are expected to keep a notebook for lectures and class assignments. The exam is based on the text. While I lecture from the text, I do not cover every point for which you are responsible. **As a college student, you are expected to read and comprehend the entire text.** I expect you to ask for clarification.

Your speeches are expected to reflect the rigor and ethical substance as described in class and in the text.

It is the student's responsibility to make note of any changes in due dates and/or assignments, and, to check with me regarding assignments in the event of an absence.

It is the student's responsibility to drop the course.



Plagiarism

All the work written in and out of class should be your own. To plagiarize is to present someone else's work as your own. Plagiarism is considered a strict offense at Santiago Canyon College and will be treated severely. According to Jacqueline Berke in **Twenty Questions for the Writer**, you must give credit to a source in the following instances:

- When you directly quote someone else.
- When you use someone else's ideas or opinions (unless these are common knowledge).
- When you use someone else's examples.
- When you cite statistics or other facts compiled by someone else.
- When you present evidence or testimony taken from someone else's argument. (73)

Students who plagiarize will receive a grade of zero (0) for the assignment. If more than two assignments are plagiarized, the student will be dropped from the class or receive a grade of "F" if the date to drop has passed.



I will **NOT** accept any assignments submitted by other means other than what I have required. That means, no emails, no hard copies, no Google Docs, etc.
